

Pr **ENHERTU® PATIENT GUIDE** **FOR POTENTIAL LUNG PROBLEMS** (Interstitial Lung Disease/Pneumonitis)

This Patient Guide has been designed to help you identify any symptoms of lung problems that you may experience while you are on treatment with ENHERTU (trastuzumab deruxtecan).

Read this Patient Guide before you start receiving ENHERTU and before each infusion.

This Guide also contains a Patient Wallet Card that you should keep with you and show it to any healthcare professional you consult (for example, if your regular healthcare professional is unavailable or if you are travelling).

This Patient Guide does not include all the information about ENHERTU. Talk to your healthcare professional about your medical condition and treatment and ask if there is any new information about ENHERTU.

Important Potential Lung Problems that May Occur with Your Treatment

Lung problems have been reported with the use of ENHERTU, including lung problems that may be severe, life-threatening, or fatal. These lung problems are often referred to as interstitial lung disease/pneumonitis. Early detection and treatment of lung problems are important to reduce the risk of serious and potentially fatal side effects.

It is important to tell your healthcare professional immediately if you notice any signs or symptoms of lung problems, such as those listed here:

- Cough
- Trouble breathing or shortness of breath
- Fever
- Other new or worsening breathing problems (e.g., chest tightness, wheezing)

Call or see your healthcare professional right away or go to the nearest Emergency Department if you experience any of these lung-related signs or symptoms. Getting medical treatment right away may keep these problems from becoming more serious.

If you develop lung problems, your healthcare professional may treat you with corticosteroid medicines. Your treatment with ENHERTU may also need to be delayed or completely stopped if you develop lung problems while on therapy.

Before Starting Treatment with ENHERTU

Tell your healthcare professional about:

- Any lung, kidney, or heart problems, or any blood problems (low blood count) you have or have had in the past, in particular if you have a history of lung problems, including inflammation of the lung known as interstitial lung disease (ILD).
- Any other medical problems you have or have had in the past.
- All the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, minerals, natural supplements, or alternative medicines. Know the medicines you take. Keep a list of them to show your healthcare professional when you get a new medicine.

This Patient Guide should not replace your healthcare professional's advice about your medical condition or your treatment.
